


At Woodlawn Middle School, we are dedicated to preparing students to become lifelong learners and productive citizens through a rigorous curriculum and a commitment to excellence.

Attendance

- ▶ “Attendance is a critical factor in any child’s school success. Children should attend school every day, except in cases of illness or emergency. It is impossible to replace the learning that happens on any school day with make-up work. Regular attendance and promptness are good habits that are expected and appreciated at all levels of schooling and in the workplace. This year, make school a priority in your household. Commit to excellence in attendance. Your child’s future depends on it.”

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Attendance

- ▶ Please send a parent note or Doctor's note when your child is absent from school.
- ▶ Students may only be absent 5 days each semester.
- ▶ Being absent 2 days each month is considered chronic absenteeism. (Students end up being absent 18-20 days from school.)
- ▶ There is no substitute for lost instructional time.



Social Media

Consider waiting to get social media until high school. If you are already on social media do the following:

- Post responsibly.
- Pause before you post. Think twice before posting.
- Consider the consequences.
- Be your best self online.
- Be safe.
- Know your privacy settings.
- Be positive.



Social Media

- Exposure to harmful or inappropriate content (drugs, violence etc.)
- Exposure to dangerous people
- Cyber bullying, a risk factor for depression and suicide
- Oversharing personal information
- Exposure to excessive advertisements
- Privacy concerns including the collection of data about teen users.
- Identity theft or being hacked
- Interference with sleep, exercise, homework, or family activities



Vaping

Vaping puts nicotine into the body.

Nicotine is highly addictive.

Nicotine can slow brain development in teens and affect memory, concentration, learning, self-control, attention and mood.

Nicotine can increase the risk of other types of addiction later in life.



Skipping/Showing up late to class



Student Academic Goals

5 Core Values


- ▶ *Respect (Do you treat people with dignity?)*


Everyone is welcome! Everyone belongs!

Dress Code

- ✓ Standard uniform khaki pants, capris or shorts not more than 3" above the knee must be worn.
- ✓ A traditional collared navy blue shirt/blouse, no more than 4 buttons, with no visible logo must be worn.
- ✓ SOLID white undershirts with sleeves that should not be longer than sleeves of uniform shirt must be worn.
- ✓ Woodlawn Middle School's Official Purple Sweatshirt or Other Official Woodlawn Middle School Sweatshirt may be worn.
- ✓ Plain brown, black, blue, navy blue, white or khaki belts must be worn. NO DESIGNS/DECORATIONS, rivets, holes, jewels/stones, or embroidery is allowed on belts.




Dress Code

- ✓ Traditional matching tennis shoes (shoes must be the same color) with closed toes and closed backs that can be secured with matching colored shoe laces that are tied must be worn in all school facilities and on school grounds.
- ✓ Only 1(one) pair of solid black, navy, or white matching socks is acceptable. Socks that come above the calf are unacceptable. Ankle or no show socks may be any color.
- ✓ Profane/obscene language, mature themes, cults, whether direct or inferred, on t-shirts, masks or other clothing is prohibited at all school functions. Reference to drugs, alcohol or tobacco products on clothing is prohibited.




Parent-Teacher Conferences
